Our first group of children went out to a cricket event at Skegness Grammar School, our governors met for the first time face to face and our Local Authority Adviser came to school to check how we were all doing for the first time since March 2020. Have you seen any trees this week that are coved in pink or white blossom. There are two pretty trees in a garden opposite the school office. My apple and pear trees have lots of pink blossom which hopefully will become apples by the autumn.

Now that the rain has stopped and it is warmer during the day and night I have put some of my little seedlings outside to get used to the weather, and to prepare for being planted in the garden in a couple of weeks. I have several different types of flowers all grown from seeds. This process is called 'hardening off'.

I have already had the french beans and broccoli plants outside for a week, so have planted them in the vegetable patch. I have had to cover them with wire frames and netting, otherwise the pigeons will eat the little plants and all my efforts will have been wasted.
