Following complaints from residents <u>and</u> parents please try to park SAFELY, LEGALLY and SENSIBLY.

What have we been learning this week (according to our school members of parliament).

Year 1

In English Year 1 have written a story about the first hippo on the moon. In Maths they have added numbers from 100. In Science they have explored different materials and their properties.

Year 2

In Maths Year 2 are learning about their 3 times tables and in English they have been writing science fiction stories, which links in with their topic of space. In Theme, they are learning about the first man on the moon.

Year 3

In Maths Year 3 have been doing Time and Length. In English they have been using inverted commas and writing down Tadeo Jones Voice. In Science they have done volume, sound and pitch.

Sunnyside Garden

Walking around the garden today I noticed the rhubarb is beginning to produce leaves and short stems are already forming. The stems will be ready to pick in a couple of weeks.

The Reception class visited last Friday and looked to see if the broad beans were growing. No sign of any shoots yet but we placed stems of holly leaves in the ground. This will protect the young plants from the pigeons and any other animals that visit the garden in the next few weeks.

On Saturday when it was cold, I spent some time clearing leaves from the vine in the greenhouse and then dug over the soil to tidy it up. Then on Sunday I washed the greenhouse inside and out to remove most of the green surface that collects on the glass during the year. Now that the glass is clean more light can get through to the plants.

The snowdrops are now dying back and this is the time of year to dig up some of the plants, divide the clumps of the little bulbs and replant them in another part of the garden. As the snowdrops disappear, the daffodils are beginning to flower.

It was lovely that Year 1 came to visit last week. They asked lots of questions and it was super that they remembered so much about their visits last year. Thank you Year 1. What good memories you have.

<u>Pizza Wraps</u>

Perfect for lunch, light teas, or rolled up and cooled for lunch boxes.

These pizza wraps are fun and easy to make without needing any special skills to make dough! These are a great alternative to 'real pizza' and lots of fun can be had with chopping, tasting and creating.

Fun to make with the family or when friends come over for tea.

You will need:

• Wraps,

(Any size or flavour and as many as you need to feed your family.)

- **Pizza toppings**, peppers, sweet corn, mushrooms, tomatoes, pineapple, herbs, olives, cheese and meats. Any of your favourite toppings!
- Passata,

(You can use blended tinned tomatoes or tomato puree or passata.)

How to do it:

- Lay out your wrap and top it like a pizza. Be sure to go to the edges to ensure the wrap doesn't burn in the oven.
- Bake on a baking tray in a preheated oven, on gas 5/190 degrees for about 10 minutes. Be sure to keep an eye on it as oven temperatures can vary.

Make it go further by using up the left over ingredients to:

Mix the left over ingredients together for a tasty sandwich filling.

Make extra wraps to fold and cool for tomorrow's lunch boxes. Cook up some pasta and cool, toss in the remaining ingredients for a cold pasta salad for tea or to pop into lunch boxes.
